#### Mayor's Message

Dear Residents:

Voters countywide will face Proposition E911 on the November 3 ballot. Proposition E911 would provide funding to improve emergency communications throughout St. Louis County through a one-tenth of one cent sales tax. Similar measures have been passed by voters in St. Charles and Jefferson counties as public safety agencies work to meet new FCC requirements for emergency communications.

St. Louis County's Proposition E911 focuses directly on improving the most critical emergency communications that affect citizens. There are 65 police departments and 43 fire agencies in St. Louis County, plus St. Louis County Police. These emergency response agencies cannot now effectively communicate with one another. While each entity could invest local taxpayer dollars in new radios to meet the FCC requirements, such systems would still be incompatible, they still would not be able to trace emergency cell phone calls and the county siren system would still unreliable. The Emergency Communication Commission has indicated that by working countywide and buying radio systems on a countywide basis, the

result would be a more cost-effective system that is fully compatible, facilitating the coordination of mutual aid and emergency services in times of need.

#### Recycling Carts Coming Soon!

Thanks to a grant from the St. Louis County Department of Health, new recycling carts should be arriving in Oakland late in October or November. The green carts with an Oakland logo will hold 64 gallons of recycling and will be delivered to residents by Waste Management. Recycling collected in the new containers will continue to be picked up as a part of routine city service.

Some tips for effective recycling include: rinse containers; include caps, lids and labels with containers; don't include containers for motor oil, insecticide, herbicide or other hazardous chemicals; don't include plastic bags (return these to the grocery store when you can); no #6 plastics which are typically found in Styrofoam or polystyrene are allowed; no paper towels, tissues or wipes can be recycled. Items that can be recycled include: plastic containers, buckets, bottles

and milk jugs; steel and tin cans; glass bottles and jars of any color; milk and juice cartons along with their caps and lids; newspapers; cardboard; brown paper bags; computer paper; junk mail (even with plastic windows); carrier stock (such as drink carrying cases); boxes for foods such as cereal or cake mix: paperback books, magazines, catalogs and telephone books.

A plastic bottle can remain in a landfill for 100 to 1,000 years, but for every ton of plastic that is recycled, we save the equivalent of two people's energy use for one year, the amount of water used by one person in two month's time, and almost two thousand pounds of oil! The City encourages residents to take advantage of the ease of the new carts and recycle whenever possible for a cleaner city and a greener See planet! the enclosed flyer for reminders about what to recycle each week.

#### **Holiday Refuse Collection**

When holidays such as Memorial Day and Labor Day fall on a Monday, our trash service will be on Tuesday that week. For questions about refuse collection or to report a missed pick-up of refuse, yard waste or recycling, call Waste Management at 506-4700.

#### Holmes Avenue Improvements

Thanks to a federal grant received by the Cities of Oakland and Kirkwood, Holmes Avenue is slated for major improvements in 2010. The scope of the project will include the replacement (but not the widening) of the existing street with new curbs and gutters, new four-foot wide sidewalks. crosswalks, chicanes (small traffic islands) to slow traffic, some new drainage features and pedestrian street lighting. The scope of the project does not include widening the street or installing a bike path. The street right of way will remain at its current width. The cities are working with an engineering firm and MODOT on the details of the project, and it is hoped that construction might begin in the spring of 2010. While Homes is under construction one lane of traffic will remain open for vehicles, and

residents along Holmes Avenue will have advance notice when work is being done on or near their driveways. The Holmes project will greatly enhance our entire community when completed, and will benefit all the residents of the City. We look forward to working with residents, MODOT and the City's engineers and contractors to make the construction as easy as possible for everyone involved!

#### **OAKLAND CITY PICNIC!!**

The City's annual picnic will take place on Saturday, October 24 from noon to 4:00 p.m. at Loewnau Park. There will be great barbeque, music, and activities for the kids. Back by popular demand will be the giant inflatable obstacle course, the face painters and the balloon artists! We will also have information from our local library and a celebration of Arbor Day in the City. All citizens are invited to participate in this fun outdoor festival!

#### Fight the Flu!

The St. Louis County Department of Health has advised residents that they may protect themselves from the flu with these simple steps: get a seasonal flu shot each year; wash hands frequently with soap and water; use anti-bacterial hand sanitizers if soap and water are not available; stay home if you have a fever; cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue or the crook of your arm; throw away used tissues and wash your hands after coughing or sneezing; don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth; and clean common surfaces like doorknobs, phones and shopping cart handles. The City wants you to stay healthy this winter!

#### **Sewer Lateral Repair Program**

The City of Oakland offers residents a Sewer Lateral Repair Program. If you think you have a collapsed pipe, contact a plumber and have the line cabled at your expense. Once you have received the tape, contact City Building Inspector Greg Hanser. He will review the tape to verify

your eligibility. eligible, the resident decides on a contractor to do the repair and then pays for the repair in Copies of the full. actual bill and receipt of payment can be sent to P. O. Box 220511, St. Louis, MO 63122 and reimbursement (up to \$2500) will be sent to you after approved at the next Board meeting.
